Sidney ANAVETS Celebrates 75 years



A.N.A&F. (ANAVETS) Sidney Museum Unit is celebrating 75 years in Sidney. Before WWII Sidney was still a small town of a few hundred people. The population grew after the war, in part by veterans from across Canada who had visited or served in the area. Early in 1949 several ex-service friends met in private homes to discuss the formation of a mutually beneficial organization and agreed that Canada's oldest service group, the Army, Navy and Air Force Veterans in Canada would fulfil their aims. On March 3, 1949 a Dominion Charter was granted to Sidney Unit 302 with 26 Charter members.

Today, membership in Sidney Unit 302 has exceeded 1000 members on this 75th anniversary. With many activities like dancing, various live entertainment, big screen TV, meat draws, sports activities like bowling, bocce ball, horseshoes, games room darts, pool, shuffleboard, card games, kitchen and simply, a casual social atmosphere awaits daily. Dominion Convention 2024

On Saturday September 7th 2024 nine of your Executive travelled to Sherbrooke Quebec to take part in the 56th Biennial Dominion Convention. The Convention was pretty intensive from September 8th through September 11th consisting of ten guest speakers, thirty three resolutions, awards and elections. It was not all meetings as there was also a sports afternoon that included shuffleboard, darts, crib and horseshoes. There was also guided bus tours on that afternoon for those that chose not to do the sports. Your Executive then returned on Thursday September 12th.

Highlights:

First speaker was Amy Meunier, Assistant Deputy Minister, Commemoration and Public Affairs at Veterans Affairs Canada (VAC). Amy spoke on the VAC rules and responsibilities, current activities including Veteran Indigenous Recognition, Benefits both disabilities and financial, transition to civilian life, Veteran homelessness, national opportunity veterans employment, mental health benefits, Operational Stress Injury (OSI) and PTSD to mention a couple, INVICTUS games coming up and the 80th anniversary D-Day.

Second speaker was BGen Lemyre, who spoke about world conflicts and threats to global stability, he spoke of climate change & usage of military operations including Arctic incursions, NOR-AD, NATO stability, support to other countries as well as domestic problems like fires and flooding. He spoke about military deployments around the globe, evacuation of Canadians from war torn locations, defence weapons, personnel shortages, support, operational readiness and high standards of ethics and professionalism and, enhance capabilities in ships, planes and subs.

Third speaker was Col Jardine, Veterans Ombudsman. He had a video presentation and talked about the Veterans Review Board seeking fairness and help understanding VAC communication.

Fourth speaker James LaCoursier Jr., National

Commander American Legion and also a member of ANIVICUS with same goals and friendships.

Fifth speaker Berkley Lawrence, President Royal Canadian Legion who just finished their Dominion Convention. Their 100th anniversary will be held in Winnipeg in 2026. Berkley was instrumental in bringing home the unknown soldier to Newfoundland. The unknown soldier was definitely from Newfoundland, and that he fought and died in northern France while enlisted with the Royal Newfoundland Regiment.

Sixth speaker was Chris McNeil, Chairman of the Veterans Review and Appeal Board responsible for administration of Veteran entitlements and benefits, review decisions of VAC, reconsiderations, pain and suffering and review of your disability.

Seventh speaker was Maureen Purvis, cofounder of No Stone Left Alone Memorable Foundation. She gave an introduction to educational commemorative program and presented a vignette with the song "No Stone Left Alone". A very "moving" song.

Eighth speaker was Ashlee Mulligan and Tabitha Beynen from the Atlas Institute for Veterans and Families. Atlas Veterans.ca talks about resources and support for OSI, military and RCMP Veterans and families mental health and well being. Digital stories are available. You can check Mindkit.ca

Nineth speaker was Glenn Ogden, Director Creative Development and Scenography the Canadian War Museum. He spoke of travelling exhibitions, outreach education and resources including online education. 2024 is the 60th anniversary of the Cyprus peacekeeping, 2025 WWII 80th anniversary, Netherlands 1944—45, Japan 1941—45, 2026 Canada/US Civil War and 2027 The Arctic exhibition. The museum has over half a million object of all types. I've been through it and it is a must for anyone's agenda when visiting Ottawa.

Tenth speaker was Dave Pearson, Fort Drum Canadian Veteran Advisory Council (FDCVAC). The FDCVAC assist and support for army retirees to US and Canada. They also provide legal aid, assistance filing medical and pay benefits, homeless advocacy and info sharing.

Resolutions:

Thirty Three resolutions were discussed. Some highlights included several on consideration of family, escort fees for immediate family living with the Veteran, under the Veterans Well Being Act (VWA) advocacy for tax free compensation for family members impacted by a Veteran with injuries and illnesses and, caregiver compensation, adjustments to the VIP program, province of legal residency, transition to civilian life, post secondary education for children of military members, exceptional incapacity allowance, pensioners dental service plan, SISIP & VAC dual programs, medical benefits with outstanding VAC claims, disability adjudication staffing, PSC lump sum benefit, security clearances, VAC case management staffing, Gulf war Veterans, bylaws and guide to disciplinary procedures updates, membership lists, Associate and Affiliate membership, procedures for the liquidation, dissolution, folding or winding-down of a Ladies Auxiliary unit or Provincial Auxiliary Command, a Mission Statement and Land Acknowledgement.

Dominion Secretary Deanna Fimrite presented a new Dominion Website that will have links to each Unit. Each Unit will have a password protected pages for pictures, events, sponsorships and whatever the Unit wishes to put on their page. We should be getting details before the end of the year.

Awards—several associate awards were given notably life memberships, Order for Service 6 and Award of Merit 6. Several Canadian/American Legion Friendship awards were give and, the King Charles III Coronation Medal was given to about 20 members including myself.
